Access to Recovery (ATR)

Provides recovery services to low-income individuals in crisis who are involved with Child Protective Services, shelters and supported housing, free and low income medical clinics, community detoxification programs, as well as clinical assessments and referrals to alcohol/drug treatment services. The program has been implemented in six counties – Clark, Pierce, King, Snohomish, Yakima, and Spokane.

Certification of Agencies and Provider Requests

Certified agencies provide a discrete program of chemical dependency treatment that meets the standards of WAC 388-805 and have obtained a certificate of approval from DSHS/DASA. A “provider” or “services provider” request may include changes in ownership, new agency applications, name changes, relocation, remodeling, addition of a service or discontinuation of a service, cancellation, closure, or anything else that may affect certification.

A program of inpatient or outpatient treatment services for youth who are subject to 15-36 weeks of confinement and who have not committed any violent or sexual offense. CDDA is administered in coordination with the Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration of DSHS.

Criminal Justice Treatment Act

Offenders (both youth and adult) with charges filed upon them by a county prosecutor or a tribal attorney are eligible to receive treatment services with criminal justice treatment revenues. DASA certified providers are required to maintain all clinical records for a minimum of six years (or seven years for publicly-funded agencies) from the date a client was last seen at their agency. Closed agencies usually maintain their own records. In a few circumstances, DASA is custodian of the records. These records are stored at the State Records Center and any requests for information fall under Public Disclosure Request criteria. Service provision and length of stay is variable and is determined by the needs of the woman and documented by patient placement criteria. Maximum length of stay is six months.

Residential Treatment Services – Youth

DASA provides funding to support a wide range of residential chemical dependency treatment services that are developmentally appropriate for low-income, substance-abusing youth ages 13-17, and their families. Services are family-oriented, safe, and designed to provide a high level of staff supervision.
