Cognition in Primary Care	Registration for Education Sessions – Cognition in Primary Care (uw.edu)	This is a self-directed, web-based learning module that reviews how to evaluate cognition in the primary care setting, making a plan for a patient with a new diagnosis of mild cognitive impairment or dementia and managing symptoms as they progress. MoCA Training Certification	MoCA Training Certification	One hour training and certification module meant to maintain MoCA's validity. Designed for busy medical professionals. Helps care providers and researchers of all backgrounds gain applicable knowledge of the cognitive domains that MoCA assesses, and helps care providers to become more confident in administering and explaining results to patients and families.	Researchers/ Academic Researchers	Yes, \$150. Training and Certification is free for students, faculty members, academic researchers, and publicly operated healthcare institutions.	Individuals must register to create an account. To complete certification for free proof of status is required (students, faculty members, academic researchers, and publicly operated healthcare institutions). You will have two months to complete the training certification program. Once the certification is passed, training will no longer be available. Retraining after 2 years is recommended but not mandatory, and cost will be at 50% of the initial training cost.
