
Your local Tribal Kinship Navigator

Hello everyone, I wanted to take the time to introduce myself. My name is Chastity Jeffries. I am an enrolled Lummi Tribal member. My Parents are Wayne Ballew Jr. and Marie (Yazzie) Ballew. My grandfather on my mother's side is Kee Yazzie. My late Grandparents are Nellie (Begaye) Chee, Wayne Ballew Sr. and Rena (Lane) Ballew.

I have recently received my Bachelor of Arts in Human Services from Northwest Indian College. I have worked for the Lummi Employment and Training Center (LETC) for five years as the receptionist, ETC services Tech II and Intake Specialist.

The Kinship Navigator Program is new for our tribal people. As the Kinship Navigator for Lummi, I am excited to learn more about this position and who the families are that would benefit from this program.

We have grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins and siblings taking care of our children, whether they are in the system or voluntarily given to the family members. Please feel free to contact me if you have a relative child or children in your care. I will be here to help you find the services that you may be eligible for. I would like to help our indigenous people keep our children within their family structures. It is important that our children keep their cultural ties and know who they are.

We would like to connect with ALL of the Kinship Caregivers (Grandparents, Fosters, and other relatives) whether or not they are involved with child welfare or other services.



What is the Kinship Navigator Program? How could it help?

The kinship navigator program is set up to assist those who need community resources to keep relative children within the community. As the kinship navigator, I will be working with those grandparents, kinship caregivers and foster parents to connect with our local resources. Most of this position is to give you information and refer you to local resources. These services include, but are not limited to, health, developmental disability services, education advocacy services, Food assistance programs, housing, support groups, legal services, training on child development and parenting classes. I am not limited to these services and resources. Please contact me, if you have a request for a specific type of resources and need help getting through that process.

Free Entry to the Seattle Aquarium for Kinship Caregivers (Relative Placements & Foster Parents)

We have a limited supply for the full time kinship caregivers to take the kiddos to the Seattle Aquarium for a family outing.

You may come into the LETC office and see if you are eligible to receive a

pass for up to two adult caregivers and five children (who are under the full time, on-going custody and care of the caregiver). The pass is entry to the Seattle Aquarium during regular hours of operation. You will need to present a valid, legal form of ID (such as a driver's license, passport or tribal ID) and the Kinship Navigator Card. This

card will need to be provided by the Kinship
SEATTLE AQUARIUM Navigator or her supervisor. The card that you

receive is good for two years from the date that it is issued.

This card is not able to cover other family members or friends.

The Seattle Aquarium is located on the scenic downtown Seattle waterfront at 1483 Alaskan Way, Pier 59. Open daily 9:30 am—5 pm. Last entry is at 5 pm; exhibits close at 6 pm. For more information, visit www.SeattleAquarium.org.


