ALTSA: NH #2015-030 USE OF ELECTRONIC-CIGARETTES IN LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES

Dear Nursing Facility/Home Administrator:

Recently some questions have been posed regarding the use of e-cigarettes ("e-cigs") in long term care settings. In December 2011, RCS issued Dear Administrator letter NH #2011-021 regarding Survey and Certification letter (S&C) 12-04: Smoking Safety in Long-Term Care Facilities. The last paragraph of this S&C states:

"A new issue concerns the use of electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes). These products are designed to deliver nicotine or other substances to the user in the form of a vapor. They are composed of a rechargeable, battery-operated heating element, a replaceable cartridge that may contain nicotine or other chemicals, and an atomizer that, when heated, converts the contents of the cartridge into a vapor. The vapor has a light odor that dissipates quickly. These e-cigarettes are not considered smoking devices, and their heating element does not pose the same dangers of ignition as regular cigarettes."

While no new S&C has been issued regarding the use of e-cigarettes, it is recommended facilities keep the following in mind when allowing residents to use a device:

- Users should always follow manufacturer recommendations when charging and using the device. A small number of incidents have occurred over the past few years when improper charging devices and/or improper batteries were used.
- The solution within the cartridge can be toxic and should be stored in a safe place away from those who could potentially drink the liquid.
- Facility policy should address the safe use and storage of e-cigarettes.
- Facilities are responsible to know if their local jurisdiction has additional ordinances or restrictions that apply to the use of e-cigarettes
