ALTSA: NH #2022-002 CENTER FOR MEDICARE AND MEDICAID SERVICES (CMS) MAKES CHANGES TO COVID-19 SURVEY ACTIVITIES AND INCREASED OVERSIGHT IN NURSING HOMES

Dear Nursing Facility/Home Administrator:

Throughout the COVID-19 public health emergency, CMS has remained vigilant in assessing the needs of Medicare/Medicaid beneficiaries, healthcare providers/suppliers, and the State Survey Agencies (the Department of Social and Health Services or DSHS). In an effort to control the spread of COVID-19, CMS developed Focused Infection Control (FIC) survey and limited onsite surveys and activities. In addition, CMS issued blanket waivers for healthcare providers. On November 4, 2021, CMS also announced the requirement that all NH staff be vaccinated against COVID-19 as a requirement for participating in Medicare and Medicaid-certified providers and suppliers.

On November 12, 2021, CMS released QSO-22-02-ALL, which announced changes made to COVID-19 survey activities and increased oversight in nursing homes. Such changes include:

- Focused Infection Control (FIC) surveys: Conduct annually and as concerns arise with the managing COVID-19, or infection control practices.
- Resuming standard recertification surveys:
 - o DSHS will resume the normal schedule moving forward;
 - o DSHS will prioritize surveys and compliance investigations according to potential risks; and
 - CMS will temporarily allow certain mandatory tasks to be discretionary or triggered based on offsite and/or onsite survey activities. The mandatory survey tasks that may be discretionary are:
 - Resident Council Meeting
 - Dining Observation Task
 - Medication Storage
- Increasing oversight in nursing homes: CMS is concerned about how residents' health and safety has been impacted during the COVID-19 public health emergency as state agencies have been unable to have the traditional level of visibility inside the nursing home. Such activities include surveying for:
 - Nurse competency:
 - o Inappropriate use of antipsychotic medications; and
 - Other concerns (i.e. unplanned weight loss, loss of function/mobility, depression, abuse/neglect, pressure ulcers).
