New Business Report out from workgroup on Tribal participation in the LTSS Trust	 Andrea Meewes Sanchez from DSHS shared the three options identified by the Tribal Participation workgroup. Tribal employer opt-in Tribal employee permanent opt-in Tribal employer opt-in, and Tribal employee permanent opt-in for non-participating Tribes The workgroup did not recommend one of the options. Instead they are recommending that the Commission includes a broad-based recommendation to do a tribal consultation around the options identified by the workgroup. This shows the Commission's desire to pursue pathways for Tribal participation and doesn't show a preference for any of the options identified by the workgroup. Suzi LeVine shared that if there's legislation that passes in the coming session in support of Option 1, ESD can include it in the minimum viable product for the premium collection that will start in January 2022. ESD will not have the necessary lead time to include the other two options in the minimum viable product for January 2022. be done in the timeframe, but Option 2 and Option 3 cannot. She also shared that Paid Family Medical Leave (PFML) is available on
	 an opt-in basis for the Tribes, but no tribes have opted in so far for PFML. Bill Moss noted that with 31,000 s Tribal employees, there's significant risk of adverse selection unless there are parameters put in place around how much time employees have to opt-in, etc.
	Senator Keiser shared there are 39 separate tribes in Washington and they need to be dealt with individually.
	Bill Moss shared how DSHS handles Tribal consultation by inviting all tribes, council members or tribal chairs, to a meeting to discuss a topic.
	For option 2, Dan suggested introducing a timeframe that they have to opt-in.
	• ESD suggested there be a critical mass interested in options 2 or 3 before moving forward with either of those options.

New Business Report out from the workgroup on non-participation and adverse selection	 Private LTC Insurance Opt-Out Ben Veghte from DSHS reported out from the workgroup on the risks associated with the opt-out option and the recommendation from the workgroup – Limit opt-out to those who had LTC insurance prior to enactment of the LTSS Trust. Senator Keiser shared the intent of the legislation was to apply to people who already had purchased LTC insurance and was not intended to be for future purchasers of LTC insurance.
	 Self-Employed Opt-In Ben reported out from the workgroup on the risks associated with the self-employment opt-in option and the recommendations from the workgroup – When a self-employed person opts in, opt-in is permanent 3-year window to opt in (by 12/31/2024 or within 3 years of becoming self-employed for the first time) Conduct spot audits of compliance among self-employed who opt in Suzi LeVine shared that PFML does not have a permanent opt-in requirement. Senator Keiser shared that the workgroup took the middle ground with the recommendations. The workgroup didn't think the mandatory opt-in for all self-employed would be politically feasible. And that allowing people to go in and out of the program as they pleased would not be good for the sustainability of the program. Suzi LeVine said there may be research funding that can be used to dig into self-employed workers and an opportunity to put together focus groups or do a survey. ACTION ITEM: Confirm if there is funding available and consider doing focus groups and surveys on the self-employed.



New Business Part Three

Review draft Commission
 Recommendations Report

- The Commission reviewed the different recommendations from the workgroup and a pulse check was done to see if there is agreement and alignment on the recommendations.
- Coverage for adults disabled before the age of 18
 - **Workgroup recommendation:** Extend coverage to all adults with disabilities that onset prior to age 18 by removing the restriction in RCW 50B.04.010(6)
 - o Most of the Commission members support the recommendation from the workgroup.
 - One Commission member supports the recommendation if SJR8212 passes, but is concerned about making this recommendation if the ballot initiative does not pass.
 - o One Commission member prefers one of the other options considered by the workgroup.
- Requirements to be a qualified individual
 - Workgroup recommendation: When deeming a person to be a qualified individual under RCW 50B.04.050(1)(b) three years within the last six years, consider at the time an individual applies for benefits, assuming an application occurs when someone needs assistance with activities of daily living.
 - o Most of the Commission members support the recommendation from the workgroup.
 - One Commission member was uncertain about the recommendation.
- Tribal participation
 - **Workgroup recommendation:** Take the three options identified by the workgroup to Tribal consultation to determine whether there is alignment with the Tribes on any of the options.
 - o Most of the Commission members support the recommendation from the workgroup.
 - One Commission member supports the consultation but would like to make sure we've got guardrails to prevent adverse selection. Bill confirmed the consultation will include discussing guardrails to discuss guarding against adverse selection and if Tribes are interested in Option 2 or Option 3 that there will be discussion about how these options will take longer because of the complexity involved. And Bill wants to make sure ESD participates in the consultation.
 - One Commission member is conflicted on the issue and wants to make sure make sure there is equity across the board.
 - One Commission member shared that if there are different programs and different allowances of who's participating and not participating, there will be administrative challenges and there won't be consistency across the board.
 - After further discussion there was a suggestion to change the recommendation to: The Commission supports a statute change that allows for Tribal participation in the LTSS Trust and endorses the Tribal employer opt-in option. The Commission recommends taking all three options identified by the workgroup to Tribal consultation to determine whether there is alignment with the Tribes on any of the options.
 - o Most of the Commission members support the revised recommendation.
