

BHHA By the Numbers* | Fiscal year 2025

The Department of Social and Health Services' Behavioral Health and Habilitation Administration offers care for people who receive residential habilitation and behavioral health services in state-operated facilities and homes throughout Washington. These facilities and homes provide round-the-clock care, 24 hours a day, seven days a week to over 2000 people. BHHA's Office of Forensic Mental Health Services also manages the state's adult forensic mental health programs, providing competency evaluation and restoration services. Together, with our state and community partners, we offer Washingtonians access to behavioral health and habilitation support, care and resources.

Since BHHA began on May 1, and this report uses data for fiscal year 2025 (through June), this report only focuses on behavioral health facilities and programs. 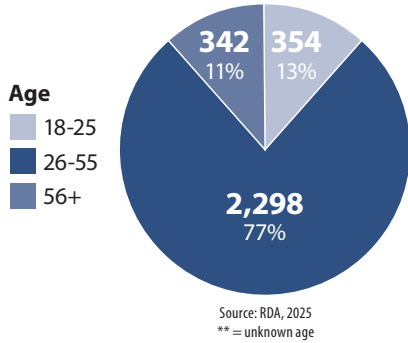

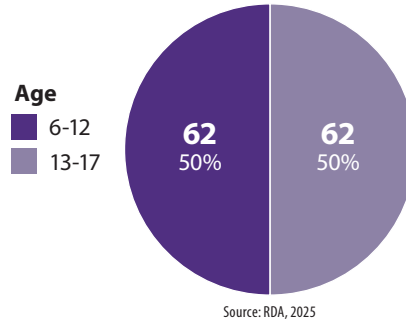

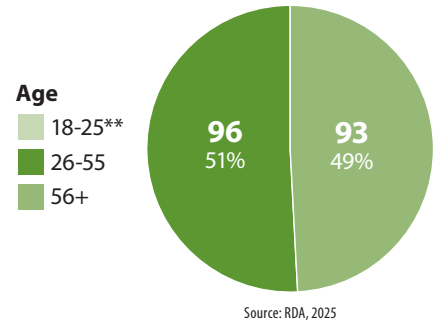
ADULT INPATIENT FACILITIES*

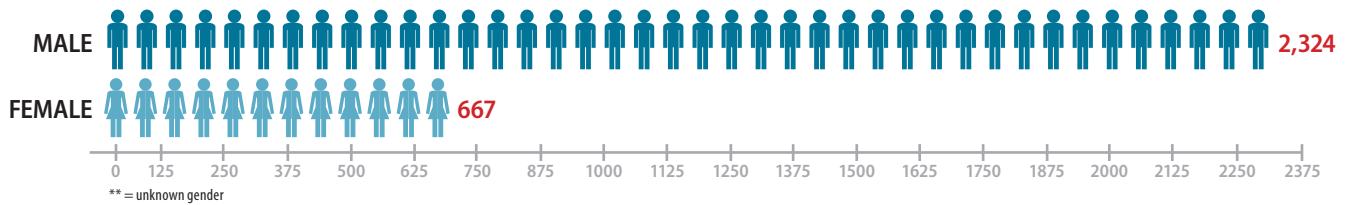

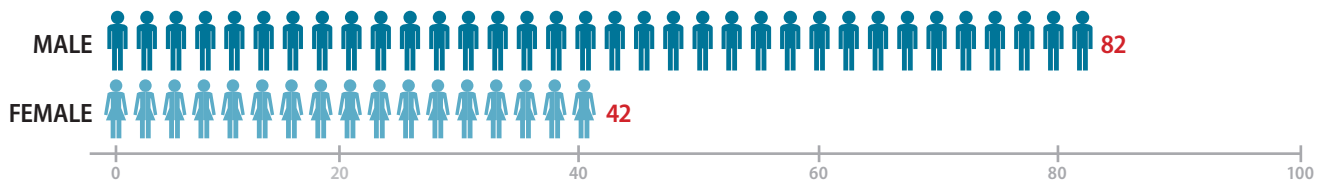


SEX (assigned at birth)

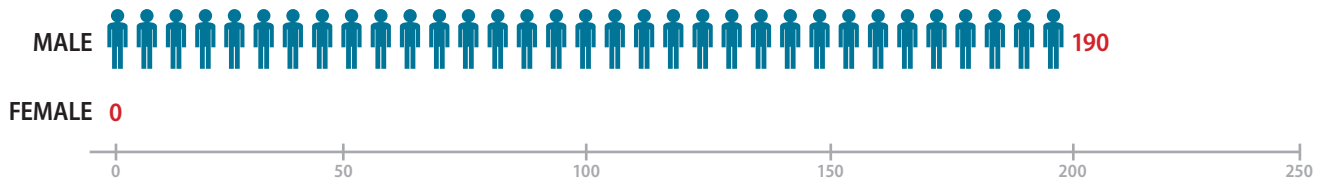

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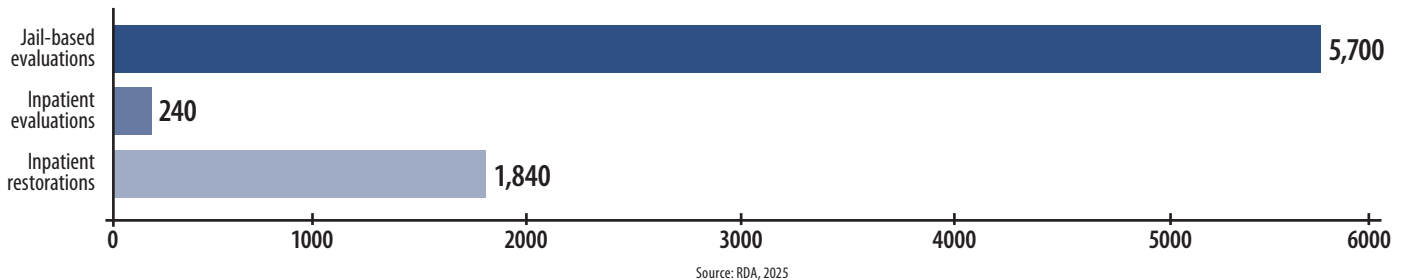

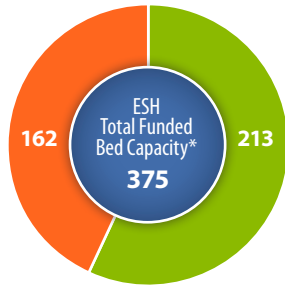
BHHA capacity and occupancy rates

It is common for there to be a difference between the number of funded beds and the average occupancy rates due to patients discharging from BHHA facilities, maintenance and renovations, and other standard operations.

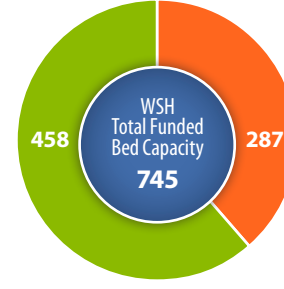
ESH AND WSH TOTAL FUNDED BEDS

 Forensic Beds (NGRI and Restoration)



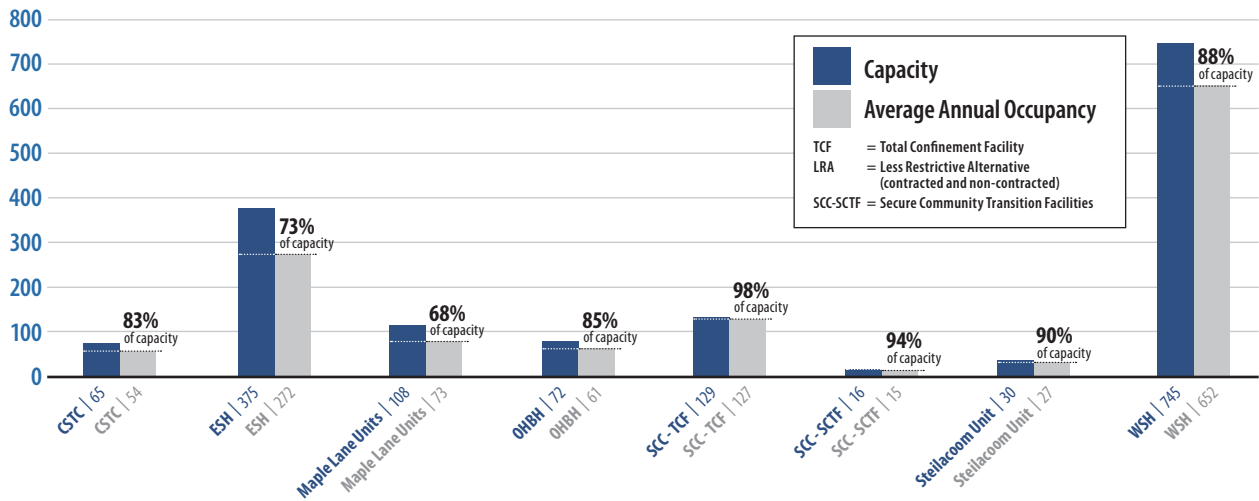
WSH Total Funded Beds

FUNDED CAPACITY AND AVERAGE ANNUAL OCCUPANCY***

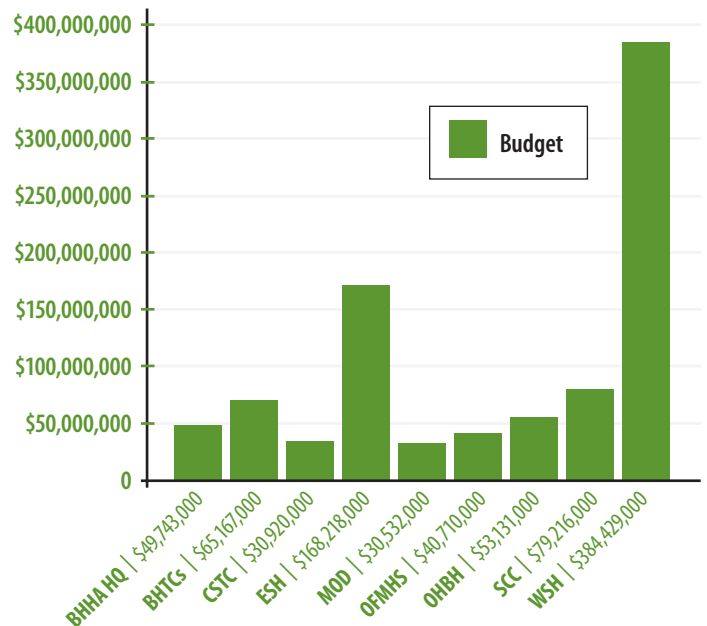
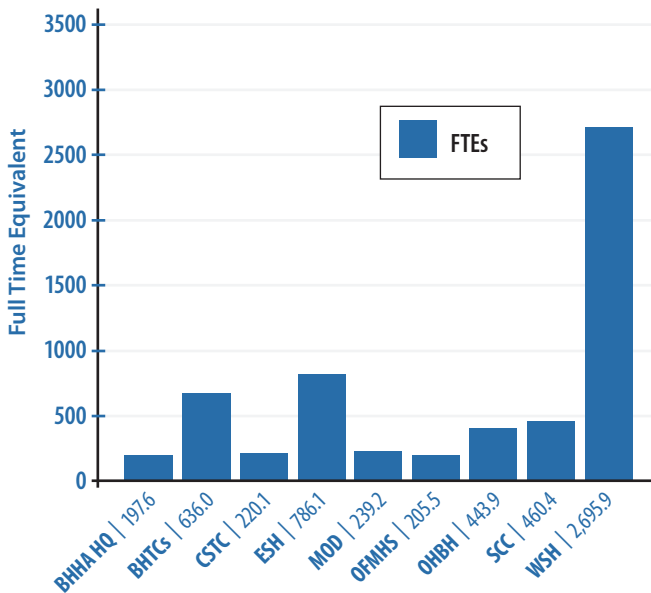
