In January 2016, Timberlands RSN and Chelan Douglas RSN will implement WISe and anticipate King County will begin implementation in early 2016 as well. The evaluation process in relation to the FYSPRTs focuses on:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Evaluations of FYSPRT meetings – meeting goals are clear, broader goals are clear and if goals are not clear, how can goals be clarified. 2. Quarterly feedback from communities about what is working and what is not working. 3. Behavioral Health Assessment System (BHAS) – reports which summarize Child Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) information at the therapist, provider, and RSN level to identify strengths and areas of improvement in services. 4. The Customer Satisfaction Survey is currently being pilot tested with Youth and Family to gather authentic feedback on the tool and WISE services being provided. Meetings in the proposed schedule occur 2-3 weeks before the Executive Leadership Team (ELT) meetings, so necessary items can be elevated to the ELT in a timely manner. The proposed schedule currently has no conflict with other meetings attended by stakeholders (CMHC, CLIP-IT, CLIP Parent Steering Committee or WISE Trainings). A suggestion was made to rotate the location of the meetings between the east and west side of the state. SYT-I Grant Presentation and next steps Pedro Garcia	<p>Topic Purpose – Information sharing and planning</p> <p>The Statewide FYSPRT is the advisory group for the State Adolescent Treatment – Enhancement and Dissemination (SAT-ED) grant and the State Youth Treatment – Implementation (SYT-I) grant. Through the SAT-ED no cost extension, new clients will continue to be accepted through 11/30/15 with service completion for enrolled clients continuing through 7/31/16. FYSPRT Transition Discussion Michael Langer and Statewide FYSPRT Tri-Leads, Andrea Parrish, Patty King and Lorrin Gehring	<p>Topic Purpose – Discuss transitions related to the Statewide FYSPRT and Regional FYSPRTs, identify items for discussion and/or to take to the Executive Leadership Team</p> <p>Statewide FYSPRT update - A current Statewide FYSPRT membership list was made available at each table. With the addition of 5 Regional FYSPRTs, membership numbers will increase with 40 -50 attendees expected at future meetings. The Statewide FYSPRT membership will be streamlined and will include one representative from each system partner; a family, youth and system partner from each region; and DBHR staff representatives.</p> <p>Regional FYSPRT updates – the Regional FYSPRTs represented at the meeting were invited to share updates from their region regarding planning, what is working well, what challenges are being addressed regionally and what challenges need attention from the state.</p> <p><u>Thurston/Mason</u> – is currently recruiting Tri-Leads and will work with University of Washington for the community needs assessment and strategic plan. The WISE Steering Committee is scheduled to meet the week of 11/16/15.</p> <p><u>Greater Columbia</u> – is currently recruiting for youth and family members and are planning their first meeting in January.</p> <p><u>Grays Harbor-Cowlitz/Timberlands</u> – working on continuing the Cowlitz FYSPRT and Grays Harbor FYSPRT, the Cowlitz Community Collaborative is adding youth and family to the already existing CLIP Committee to defer youth from CLIP.</p> <p><u>Southwest WA</u> – the Clark/Skamania FYSPRT has been meeting since April 2015 with 15-25 attendees at each meeting. A subject topic is presented at each meeting to keep people involved. A Southwest FYSPRT website and Facebook/twitter are up and running. HCA met with stakeholders in the community and recommendations will go through HCAs process. Reports it has been a struggle to get WISE provider agencies to the table.</p> <p><u>Pierce County</u> – holding weekly planning meetings plus planning a community meeting in December. Plan to gather needs from those in attendance and send out a survey to gather information from those not in attendance. Planning to have the first FYSPRT meeting in late January and have FYSPRT membership select their Tri-Leads. An existing committee, the Children’s Policy Executive Team, has suspended their charter and bylaws to meet as a FYSVRT. The last meeting was attended by family and system partners and a gap exists with youth voice.</p> <p><u>King County</u> – will take a collaborative approach and contract to bring the FYSVRT together.</p> <p>Useful resources and suggestions for challenges identified during the discussion include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A possible incentive for youth membership on the FYSVRT could be to look into offering community service hours for FYSVRT participation. 2. System partners from Rehabilitation Administration, Children’s Administration and Developmental Disabilities Administration all offered to disseminate FYSVRT information and agreed to assist in making connections/provide contact information for individuals within their systems that may be interested in participating on Regional FYSVRTs.
