A joint notification from HCA and DSHS was sent to Tribal Leaders, Indian Health Services, Tribal 638 Facilities, and Urban Indian Health Organizations regarding the State's intent to submit a waiver ren 4/8/16. The letter included:

-The following anticipated impact statement: Through Tribal comments and Tribal consultations related to the Waiver amendment, effective date 4/1/16, HCA and DSHS understand that, by mandatorily in services, the Waiver (prior to the amendment) has had a number of impacts on AI/ANs and the Indian Health Service, Tribal 638 Facilities, and Urban Indian Health Organizations (together, the I/T/Us), incl assessments for authorization of payment for Medicaid covered services, agreeing on crisis coordination plans, and access to culturally appropriate services.

As a result of the discussions held through Tribal roundtable and Consultation, all parties including CMS recognized the AI/AN population to be able to choose SUD and mental health services through FF meaningful discussion to develop a mutually agreed upon plan for moving forward the State requested a 90-day extension on the current waiver amendment. This 90-day extension moves the expiration da waiver renewal submission date to 9/30/16. In December 2016, the State was granted another extension until 6/30/2017. Another Tribal consultation was held on 3/9/17.

HCA and DSHS have continued to meet with Tribal Governments and I/T/Us and have come to agreement on language for the waiver renewal that reflects the plan a behavioral health FFS model for the Al efforts by the Tribes and the State to develop a tribal-centric behavioral health service system that is carved out of managed care. HCA and DSHS are committed to continued work with Tribal Government subgroup meetings as needed to achieve the goals set forth.

The Tribes continue to express concerns similar to those previously identified for the waiver amendment. The state understands the concerns raised by Tribes to be 1) Continued and equal access for tribal n upon crisis coordination plans between Tribes and the regions; 3) lack of representation of Tribes on Governing Bodies for the BHOs. DSHS and HCA have continued to work with the Tribes through the I HCA will be working with the tribes to establish a FFS Behavioral Health Program for the AI/AN population by July of 2017 and will plan to do a waiver amendment to carve the AI/AN population out of

The Washington legislature (RCW 71.24.850) set forth two pathways for the integration of behavioral health and physical health care by January 1, 2020. The first task for the state was to establish Regional Behavioral Health care purchasing to begin April 1, 2016.

Beginning in 2016, regions may become Fully Integrated Managed Care Regional Service Area and adopt a purchasing model in which care for Medicaid beneficiaries is delivered through contracts betwe both medical and behavioral health (mental health and substance use disorder services); or, Counties may establish Behavioral Health Organizations (BHOs) as Prepaid Inpatient Health Plans and adopt a p substance use) disorders for Medicaid beneficiaries is delivered through contracts between Department of Social and Health Services and the BHOs. As the state continues to expand Fully Integrated Managed livery system. These managed care entities contract with service providers to deliver integrated care in each RSA.

Each RSA must contain a sufficient number of Medicaid lives to support full financial risk managed care contracting for services, be made of counties that are contiguous with each other, and reflect natural

Beginning April 1, 2016, counties in nine of the 10 RSAs will adopt a purchasing model in which behavioral health care for Medicaid beneficiaries is delivered through contracts with the BHOs and physic contracts with MCOs or provided through fee for service.
