Chris holds a Master's degree in Social Welfare from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, with extensive postgraduate training in family therapy and substance abuse. He has been the featured presenter at over 300 conferences and workshops in 30 states. He is deeply influenced as a parent of a child with a variety of complex and challenging developmental needs.
