State/Tribal Relations: Why is it Important?

Census statistics show that the poverty rate in 2012 for single-race American Indians and Alaska Natives was 29.1%--the highest of any race group. For ESA to achieve our mission "To transform lives by helping people build better lives", we must continue to focus on working in partnership with Washington's 29 federally recognized tribes to develop culturally relevant services. Culturally relevant services begin by recognizing Indian sovereignty and building government-to-government relationships with each tribe. Closing this poverty gap is critical in impacting the health and safety of American Indians and decreasing poverty rates in Washington. ESA's success in State/Tribal relations has resulted in intergovernmental agreements, and programs and services for American Indians consistent with the Centennial Accord, DSHS American Indian Administrative Policy 7.01, and RCW 43.376.
