Members of the Chehalis Tribe and South Puget Sound Intertribal Planning Agency (SPIPA) prepared delicious fry bread, and ESA staff donated crockpots of their favorite chili and jars of their world-famous salsas.

The highlight of our celebration was the singing and drumming by members of the Chehalis Intertribal Canoe Family. They performed several songs. Shannon Comenout gave a detailed explanation about the meaning of each song before they began to sing. ESA staff greatly appreciates them sharing a little bit of their culture with us.

Vickie Era-Pankretz, an artist and member of the Alutiiq-Koniag Tribe, brought in wonderful array of arts and crafts for everyone to enjoy. The DCS Tribal Relations Team (TRT) provided a slide show featuring pictures taken during the recent Paddle to Nisqually along with photos taken over the years of previous Tribal Canoe Journeys and celebrations. TRT also provided a resource table featuring many excellent handouts and resource materials.

Even if you miss celebrating American Indian Heritage in the month of November, look for other opportunities throughout the year to learn about Indian tribes and tribal culture.
