Native Americans were the original inhabitants of what is now the United States. They have inhabited the area now known as Washington State since time immemorial, and tribal members and descendants have greatly helped to shape our social, economic, environmental and political landscape.

The State of Washington has a government to government relationship with each of the twenty-nine federally-recognized Indian tribes in the state, as outlined in the Centennial Accord and RCW 43.376, and the DSHS implementation of that relationship is through DSHS Administrative Policy 7.01, American Indian Policy.

The month of November always serves as a great reminder and opportunity to honor the contributions, achievements, sacrifices and cultural and historical legacy of American Indian and Alaska Natives. Our state, and other state, local and federal governments celebrate National Native American Heritage Month, by honoring the unique heritage and contributions of this continent's First People, and reaffirming the commitment to respect each tribe's sovereignty and cultural identity.
