

On July 4, 2025, the president signed a continuing resolution, H.R.1, that changes Medicaid eligibility. Beginning in **October 2026**, only U.S. citizens, lawful permanent residents, and non-citizens who are Cuban Haitian Entrants or residents from Compact of Free Association nations will qualify for Medicaid coverage. This means immigrants and refugees who rely on care will lose access.

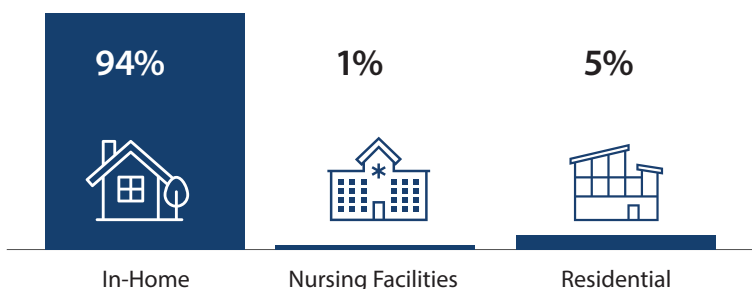
**HCLA's current estimates show over 2,700 people would be affected.** These are older adults and people with disabilities who are medically fragile. Many live with serious health conditions such as dementia, behavioral health needs, substance use disorders, or heart disease.

HCLA clients receive support in different settings:

- **94% of all clients impacted** are receiving in-home services.
- Others live in licensed residential facilities.
- A smaller number live in institutions.

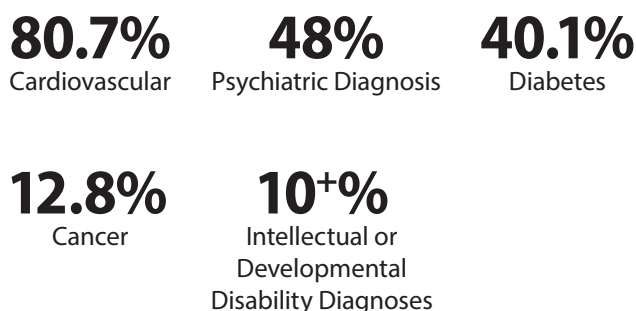
All of these people need help with daily activities.
