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

SUMMARY

- This measure is one indicator of whether youth leaving JRA programs are successful in re-entering the community and remaining crime free.
- The readmission rate continues to be under 10%. This data does not include information on whether a youth entered adult corrections or received community sanctions for a crime. A more complete measure of whether a youth is remaining crime free is an 18 month measure of felony recidivism.

ACTION PLAN

- Continue to improve the use and practice of evidence based programs and reentry programs to serve youth and their families.
- Continue work with RDA to implement an approach to regularly analyze youthful recidivism which will include data on youth prosecuted as adults or who receive community sanctions.

DATA SOURCE: Automated Client Tracking System (ACT); supplied by Rebecca Kelly.

MEASURE DEFINITION: Percent of youth released from JRA by fiscal year who do not experience readmission within 12 months of their release.

DATA NOTES: 1 Ten year average is a rolling average of the current year plus the previous 9 years.



SUMMARY

- Youth success as they reenter the community and avoid future crime depends in part on the services and supports they access.
- This data indicates that JRA youth are accessing DSHS funded medical benefits at an improved rate. Not all JRA youth are eligible for this benefit, but the high rate of youth receiving benefits indicates the referral process is effective.
- Benefits including medical and behavioral health services are key factors in youth maintaining a crime free lifestyle.

MEASURE DEFINITION: Percentage of JRA Institution "Leavers" enrolled in Medicaid medical coverage, by age.



Improve academic achievement

SUMMARY

- JRA continues to examine test scores of a small sample of youth that left institutions (90 youth per time period).
- JRA continues to work with the academic schools to prioritize and improve youth educational progress.

ACTION PLAN

- JRA has recently completed work with the Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators (CJCA) to improve the data collection process and increase the pool of youth with educational data. This new process will help with ensuring that the data reflects the full group of youth served by JRA.

MEASURE DEFINITION: Review of 90 records starting in October 2011 and 120 records prior to October 2011 (30 from each of the JRA institutional facilities) from youth released during or right before the respective data collection month.

DATA NOTES: 1 Updated twice per year. 2 JRA institutional facilities include: Green Hill School, Naselle Youth Camp, and Echo Glen Children's Center. 3 Data from October 2011 forward does not include Maple Lane School which officially closed July 1, 2011.



Residential fill rates in juvenile rehabilitation institutions and community facilities

Statewide Average



SUMMARY

• Residential population within juvenile residential programs continues to trend down.

- Population at juvenile institutions is consistently above 100%
- Population at community facilities is below target of 90%
- Population varies with admissions, transfers, and discharges

• Target is for residential fill rates between 90% and 101% of the funded bed capacity at both juvenile institutions and community facilities.

• When the residential population exceeds 101% of capacity, the cost of care at the facility also goes up. In addition, the lower community facility fill rates do not allow the administration to efficiently utilize staffing at those facilities.



MEASURE DEFINITION: Percent of health assessments completed within seven days of a youth's admission to JR.

DATA NOTES: 1 Beginning October 2012 to current, JR increased its sample size to ALL youth exiting JR institutions. Steady increase began in October 2012, but the last two data collection periods reflect the year round data collection.















SUMMARY

- The percent of DVR clients who go to work fluctuates between 50 - 60%. The federal standard is 55.8%.
- DVR's goal is to assist at least 60% of clients with Individualized Plans for Employment to successfully go to work.
- This is challenging because of two primary factors:
 - 1) *DVR job seekers face the worst job market in decades; even though the state unemployment rate is declining many DVR clients find it hard to compete against those with more work experience.*
 - 2) *Half of all DVR clients experience significant mental illness barriers to employment (many in combination with other disabling conditions). Only about one-half of these clients are eligible for community mental health treatment – many do not successfully complete DVR services because they cannot get needed mental health services.*

ACTION PLAN


- Continue working with the Employment Security Department to develop more "on-the-job training" job placements for DVR clients.
- Implement working agreements with the Department's Division of Behavioral Health & Recovery, Community Services Division, Regional Support Networks, and mental health providers to better serve DVR clients in overcoming their mental illness barriers to employment.
- Ongoing implementation of an on-line self-assessment and referral tool on the DVR website that emphasizes individuals who are referred for VR services must want to go to work.
- Continue filling vacant VR Counselor positions as quickly as possible; less caseload disruption leads to a higher rehabilitation rate.

SUMMARY

- While there is month-to-month variation, DVR primarily meets or exceeds the targeted number of clients who achieve employment outcomes each month.
- The count of employment outcomes is made up of clients whose cases are closed after being employed for at least 90 days and no longer requiring DVR services.

ACTION PLAN

- DVR's trend for the past 3 fiscal years has been to increase the number of clients who achieve employment outcomes year-over-year. This trend will be sustained by delivering quality VR services and effectively managing caseloads.



Equal access to programs and services

Ratio of access for minorities to vocational rehabilitation programs and services compared to non-minority access

SUMMARY

- DVR consistently exceeds the federal target for the ratio of minority clients served compared to non-minority clients.
- Equal access to DVR services is a federal requirement and measured as a ratio between the rate of service delivery to minority clients compared to the rate of service delivery to non-minority clients.

ACTION PLAN

- Continue placing a strong value on serving a client population that reflects the racial, ethnic and cultural diversity of our state.
- Maintain and continue building effective relationships with a variety of stakeholders and partners who assure that a diverse cross-section of clients are referred to DVR on a regular basis.









- Sex offender treatment is offered to all residents
Residents engage voluntarily if interested.
- Engagement provides the opportunity to move toward a less restrictive alternative (LRA).
- Data demonstrates an increase in voluntary participation.

- Continue to actively encourage treatment participation of residents through education and exposure to the treatment program.
- Outreach of clinical team to new admissions.
