Assistive Technology

Overview

Assistive Technology can make life easier, increase autonomy and independence and encourage individuals to live the life they want to live.

Assistive Technology are items, equipment, devices or systems that are used to help a person live a more independent life. This could include items such as tablets, communication applications, switches, voice-activated smart speaker and smart plugs to turn on or off an appliance, and adaptive utensils to assist with activities such as eating, dressing and writing. Assistive Technology also includes help learning to use the device and technical support if needed.

Eligibility Requirements

Recipients must have been determined to be an eligible client by the Department of Social and Health Services' Developmental Disabilities Administration and be enrolled on any of these DDA programs:

- · Community First Choice.
- Home and Community Based Services 1915c Waiver.
- Pre-Admission Screening and Resident Review.
- Roads to Community Living Grant.

Budget

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, Assistive Technology was available on only two of our five waivers. We expanded availability to all waivers through Appendix K flexibilities. In September 2022, Assistive Technology was added permanently to all five waivers.

Participants receive up to \$550 each year for Skills Acquisition Training or Assistive Technology.
