Introduction

During the 1969 special session of the Washington State Legislature the Juvenile Probation Subsidy Act was passed. Under this act, the Washington State Department of Institutions (now subsumed within the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS)) was authorized to subsidize the cost of specialized county probation supervision programs for juveniles who could otherwise be committed to a Washington State juvenile institution. A major goal of the Juvenile Probation Subsidy Program is to reduce unnecessary commitments of juveniles to state rehabilitation facilities through the strengthening and improving of community-oriented programs.

Prior to the enactment of the Juvenile Probation Subsidy Program in 1969 the development and implementation of optimal care and treatment services for delinquent juveniles was severely restricted. Specifically, treatment services provided by the county juvenile courts were suffering from excessively high caseloads, increased time requirements devoted to investigative matters and court appearances, paucity of treatment resources and strategies, and low, non-competitive probation staff salaries. As a result, commitments to juvenile rehabilitation facilities became the commonly prescribed treatment program.

A self-perpetuating cyclical system had evolved. Problems cited became increasingly inseparable; each seemingly regenerating the others. County juvenile courts were unable to meet the treatment needs of delinquent

youth in the community and, thus were forced to commit an ever increasing number of youths to the care of the state juvenile facilities. In turn, the continued population growth in the state's facilities forced the former Department of Institutions to continue building bigger and "better" institutions. As additional institutional beds became available, the counties committed more youth. As the counties committed more youth, the Department of Institutions further increased bed capacity. In effect, commitment of the delinquent juvenile to a state facility became the prescribed treatment program, not always by need, but as custom required, through the lack of acceptable alternatives to institutionalization. Increased numbers of institutional beds, in effect, relieved the counties of the need and responsibility to provide improved and needed community-based services for delinquent youth.

The passage of the Probation Subsidy Act (House Bill 408 subsequently referred to as RCW 13.06) was not accidental. Concerned county and state officials became aware of a new and innovative strategy operating in the State of California. Little was known, other than that youth were being kept out of state facilities and that the treatment was being met by the community, in the community. Theoretically, the program in California was paying its own way--the savings in the cost of institutionalization were being shared with participating counties in the form of "subsidy payment"; the concept seemed logical and sound. A team of state and county juvenile justice and treatment professionals visited California to inquire about the program. Upon returning to Washington, this group sold the basic concept and program to Governor Evans, and then Director of the Department of Institutions, Dr. Conte. As a result, House Bill 408 was introduced and passed in the 1969 Legislature with an effective date of July 1, 1969.

The county probation programs supported under the Probation Subsidy Act are intended to provide a variety of new treatment techniques for treating juvenile offenders assigned by the juvenile courts. Strict regulations concerning program design, implementation, and application were foregone in order to foster creativity in the development of new and innovative ways of providing better rehabilitation programs for juveniles in the community. The intent of the act was to: (1) increase the protection afforded the citizens of the state; (2) permit a more even administration of justice in the juvenile courts throughout the state; (3) rehabilitate juvenile offenders in the community; and, (4) reduce the necessity for commitment of juveniles to state juvenile correctional facilities by strengthening and improving the supervision of juveniles placed on probation by the juvenile courts of the state. Further, that a "special supervision program" be one embodying a degree of supervision substantially above the usual or the use of new techniques in addition to or instead of routine supervision.

As Probation Subsidy evolved under the guidance of state and county juvenile court directors five specific objectives were defined. These are to: (1) reduce commitment rates to state juvenile rehabilitation facilities by 25% or more in participating counties; (2) reduce overall costs to the state for rehabilitating selected delinquent youth; (3) provide higher quality probation services to selected youthful offenders through (a) reducing probation officer caseloads, and (b) making funds available for purchase of additional services as needed; (4) provide increased protection to the community through more consistent, uniform supervision of probationers; and, (5) reduce the extent to which youths become involved in repeated offenses.

During the 1971-1973 biennium, a total allocation of approximately \$1,850,000 (including approximately \$500,000 of LEAA funds) was allocated to the Subsidy Program. Approximately \$3,638,000 (including approximately \$1,400,000 of LEAA funds) was appropriated for the 1973-1975 biennium. At the present, an appropriation of approximately \$4,200,000, consisting solely of state supported funds is anticipated for the 1975-1977 biennium.

County Participation is on a strictly voluntary basis. The degree or type of court participation is controlled by the numbers of youths historically processed through the courts. Participation by courts with consistent commitments above 30 per year is limited to the "special supervision program". Counties whose past commitment experience is less than 30 per year may elect to participate in either the "special supervision program" or the "alternate program".

The "special supervision program" is basically one of people, tools, and specialized services with reimbursement of program expenses. It is predicated on the reduction of commitment rates. The reduction rate calculations are based on the following.

1. Base Commitment Rate (BCR): that figure obtained from calculating the commitments per one hundred thousand population of each county for either the period of 1964 through 1968 or the period 1967 through 1968 whichever is higher.
2. Expected Commitment Rate (ECR): that figure obtained by multiplying the county population (certified as of April 1 of a given year) by the BCR.

3. Commitment Reduction Number (CRN): that number which results from subtracting each county's actual commitments during the year from the ECR for the year.

The commitment reduction number multiplied by \$4,000 establishes the amount of reimbursement for which the county is eligible. Reimbursement is by actual program cost or by the maximum amount of reimbursement (CRN X \$4,000) whichever is the lesser.

For those counties that elect the "alternate program", the state provides reimbursement to the county for the salary and employee benefits of one additional probation officer plus, on approval of the program coordinator, an amount not to exceed \$5,000 to be used for the purchase of treatment services.

Beginning in January 1970, 18 juvenile courts elected to participate in the more extensive "special supervision program" and 8 counties elected to participate in the smaller "alternate program". Although the Probation Subsidy Program became operational in January 1970, a coordinated data system was not implemented until 1971. This system was implemented to insure a unified data base appropriate to all participants. Initial reporting through the system began in March of 1971. However, not all counties involved in the Probation Subsidy Program at that time participated in the reporting system.

The reporting system consists of two input documents completed for offenders participating in the program. The Assignment Report (Appendix A) is completed when the juvenile is assigned to the Subsidy Program and provides

data on basic descriptors, referral history, offense characteristics, service needs, and case rating. The Release Report (Appendix B) is completed when the client is terminated from the program. Basic data, including reason for release, program benefit, program offense history, services provided and case rating are gathered at this time.

Method

Except where otherwise noted, data were obtained from the computerized files maintained by the Office of Information Systems. These files contain information on each admission to the juvenile system as to social and family history, offense history, educational and vocational experience and various other classifications and demographic variables.

In looking at the overall program the specific program objectives listed above will be examined. The first is the reduction of commitment rates by at least 25% in the participating counties. Data related to commitment rates for each county were obtained from DSHS files and expected commitment rates were computed as described in the previous section. Using these figures, a simple comparison was made to determine whether or not the objective had been met. Comparisons were also made between participating and non-participating counties to further demonstrate any observable impact of Subsidy on commitment rates.

The second objective is the reduction of overall cost to the state for the processing of delinquent youth. Data related to per capita cost in running the Probation Subsidy Programs were obtained from the Office of Operations Review, as were figures regarding per capita cost to the State

for the operation of juvenile institutions. Recognizing that various fixed costs to the state would not be immediately impacted by reduced commitments, the two per capita cost figures were compared for possible savings to the State through the Subsidy Program.

The third objective, that of providing higher quality service to program participants by reducing caseloads and providing funds for the purchase of needed services, was left with subjective data for evaluating the "quality" of services. Participating counties were asked for their appraisal as to whether or not, or to what degree, services had improved. A sampling of responses will be presented as appraisals made by program staff for use in determining whether or not the program objective has been met.

In addition to the two specific points about caseloads and funds, the intent of objective three appears to be the assessment of whether or not the Juvenile Probation Subsidy Program was established and is functioning as originally conceptualized. Consequently, a comprehensive analysis was conducted of the information found in the computerized files to determine the number and types of probationers, number and types of services given, and the degree the program is functioning on a statewide basis. This data will be used to determine the extent Probation Subsidy was implemented and is functioning.

The assessment of objectives four and five require data systems which are not established or operational. For example, there is not a data system that records "regular" county probation caseloads. Therefore, the numbers of probationers cannot be compared between regular and Subsidy probation.

Likewise, the Criminal Justice Information System is not yet operational so that probationers cannot be tracked to determine those that later are committed to adult institutions or leave the original county's jurisdiction. Moreover, objective five could only be evaluated by comparing comparable groups who receive Probation Subsidy and those who do not. The establishment of a comparision group who were deprived of the Subsidy Program would not currently be possible (see a further discussion of this point on page 23). Finally, time constrains for the evaluation report further limited the research methodology. An examination of possible future research to assess these objectives is discussed in a subsequent section.

### Results

#### Objective 1

As pointed out previously, the history of the Washington State Juvenile Institutions prior to the implementation of the Juvenile Probation Subsidy Act was one of continuing high numbers of commitments. Figure 1 shows the first and re-admissions to Cascadia Reception-Diagnostic Center (CRDC), during fiscal years 1965-1974. Although not directly reflected in the data shown, the figures for 1965-1969 represent the upper end of a gradually continuing increase in the number of admissions to juvenile facilities for a number of years. With the implementation of the Probation Subsidy Program, admissions dropped dramatically to a low of 618 in 1973 and then showed a slight increase to 688 in 1974.

Figure 2 shows expected first and re-admissions to CRDC (as predicted from base commitment rates without Probation Subsidy intervention), actual commitments to CRDC charged to participating counties, and reported

assignments to Juvenile Probation Subsidy during calendar years 1971 through 1974. Participating counties would have been expected to commit 1,230.5 clients during 1971, 1,286 during 1972, 1,313 during 1973, and 1,317 during 1974, without the intervention of the Probation Subsidy Program. In fact, 522 were committed during 1971, 553 during 1972, and 544.5 during 1973, and 584.5 during 1974. Actual reported assignments to Juvenile Probation Subsidy increased from a low of 522 in 1971 to a high of 1,964 in 1974.

Table I shows data concerning the base commitment rates (BCR) expected commitment rates (ECR) by year, chargeable commitments by year, and commitment reduction number (CRN) by year for all counties who had previously participated or were currently participating in the Probation Subsidy Program as of January 31, 1974. Utilizing the base commitment rate calculations, all counties were expected to commit a total of 5,146.5 cases during the four year period. Beginning in 1973, participating counties were allowed to commit delinquent youth through the CRDC for diagnostic purposes only. In these instances, juveniles are transferred to the diagnostic center where a comprehensive diagnostic work-up is completed during an approximate six-week period. At the end of the diagnostic work-up, a juvenile is discharged directly from CRDC back to the county from which the youth came, unless the county specifically commits the youth for institutional placement. The county utilizes the diagnostic work-up completed by CRDC to determine the most appropriate placements and treatment regimen in these cases. For purposes of determining the net commitment number, the counties are charged for one-half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) of a commitment for diagnosis only, whereas juveniles committed to CRDC as a regular commitment are counted as one (1) commitment.

The overall commitment reduction number for each of the four years shows a gradual increase from 676.9 in 1971 to 768.5 in 1973. In 1974 the commitment reduction number declined somewhat to 731.5. In total there was a commitment reduction of 2,908.9 for all participating counties during the period. This number reflects the number of juveniles from participating counties who, without the intervention of Probation Subsidy, would have been expected to be committed to CRDC during the period.

#### Objective 2

The second objective specified for the Probation Subsidy Program was to reduce overall costs to the State for rehabilitating selected delinquent youth. Data obtained from the State of Washington Department of Social and Health Services Operations Review report completed on the Probation Subsidy Program on May 7, 1975, show that the average annual cost of a commitment to a State juvenile correctional institution is \$22,663. The annual Probation Subsidy Program cost to the State per juvenile is \$3,675. This shows a total commitment reduction saving of \$18,988 per average commitment. The Operations Review report indicates that the 1973 reduction in commitments "should ultimately result in a net reduction of expenditures by the Department in excess of \$14 million". Additionally, they state that "the short-run impact on Department expenditures will not equal the long run potential because of fixed costs; e.g., maintenance of youth camps and institutions do not vary in the short run with the reduction of commitment". The participating counties are servicing more clients than was expected or required per commitment reduction dollar (Figure 2).

### Objective 3

The third objective specified for Probation Subsidy was that the program provide higher quality probation services to selected youthful offenders through (a) reducing probation officer caseloads, and (b) making funds available for purchase of additional services as needed. Although data concerning caseloads prior to the implementation of Probation Subsidy are not consistently available, statements received from a sample of the participating counties indicate that functional probation officer caseloads have been reduced since the implementation of Probation Subsidy. Generally, these statements indicate that prior to the Probation Subsidy Program, if probation was available at all, county probation officers were burdened with an extensive intake and investigation caseload which made substantive treatment for county probationers unrealistic.

"Prior to 1971 any juvenile probation subsidy services were performed in San Juan County by the prosecuting attorney. \$250 was budgeted for this in 1969 and 1970."

- San Juan County

"The Probation Subsidy Program has had a dramatic and positive impact on the overall functioning of the Pacific/Wahkiakum Counties Probation Department. Prior to Probation Subsidy, this office consisted of a lone probation officer. There was little actual supervision of probationers as his time was taken up with intakes, court hearings, paperwork, etc. Additionally, the lone probation officer had little time for such things as program development, community education, or the development of community resources."

- Pacific/Wahkiakum Counties

"Prior to the inception of Probation Subsidy, Spokane County had no regular probation services. Probation duties were handled by Court Investigation officers on a low priority basis. Since the inception of Probation Subsidy, the juvenile court has established a regular court probation caseload which works in conjunction with the Probation Subsidy Program but is a separate county-funded program."

- Spokane County

"One other additional change is being effected and began with the change of judge and the development of the Probation Subsidy Program. We have switched the philosophy from that of probation officer to probation or rehabilitation counselor, insisting that the investigative functions remain with the police departments, that the major responsibility of our agency is that of counseling children or on behalf of children and that the business of arresting children, investigation of crimes, etc., must reside within the jurisdiction of the several police agencies throughout the county."

- Whitman County

"Prior to the implementation of the Probation Subsidy Program in 1970, only limited probation supervision was being provided. During 1968 and 1969 one person in the department was assigned to supervise all probationers. His caseload varied between 80 and 120 cases. It was simply impossible to do more than 'shuffle' papers and 'put out fires'."

- Skagit County

The second part of the third objective is concerned with making funds available for the purchase of additional services as needed. Again, the replies from the county probation departments would suggest that in their judgment Probation Subsidy has fostered both the expansion of existing services in the community and the creation of formerly non-existent services.

"With the cooperation of our judges and county commissioners we have been most careful to see that local funding has not decreased as the result of Probation Subsidy. In fact, quite the contrary is true. State Subsidy monies have been matched by at least equal contributions by local government toward such ancillary services as psychiatric evaluation and treatment, placement resources, and training of probation staff. Again, this seems to me to be the kind of state/local partnership which makes a good deal of sense."

- Skagit County

"The county probation caseloads have benefited from the implementation and organization of community resources for Subsidy youth.

"County cases may also benefit from programs which otherwise may not have been available. Such services include employment, recreation, and drug awareness counseling."

- Grays Harbor County

"Probation Subsidy has seemingly caused the various public and private social service agencies to re-examine service priorities. In some cases, this has resulted in increased staffing, program reorganization, and program development, e.g., Mental Health First Offender Drug Program. Probation Subsidy has caused this 'awareness' through:

- a) requiring agencies to provide services to youth who have traditionally been incarcerated; and,
- b) Probation Subsidy staff have actively participated in the development of new programs necessary for the maintenance of youth within a community."

- Walla Walla County

"I believe services available in the community have increased because of the Subsidy Program. Again, as I said before, two years ago there was one employee where now we have two full-time and two part-time. All of these have been available because of the community organization aspect of the Probation Subsidy Program, as well as professional administrative skills and obtaining outside grants."

- Whitman County

"With the inception of Probation Subsidy and its direct effect upon the implementation of programs designed for youngsters assigned to Subsidy, there has been a carryover effect in allowing youngsters on the regular court probation caseload to have access to these services. These services were developed specifically for Probation Subsidy by community agencies but there has been a carryover in allowing services to be delivered to regular court probationers."

- Spokane County

"Since Cowlitz County's participation in the Probation Subsidy Program in January 1970, several things have occurred in the regular probation program. There has been a reduction in the caseload for the probation officers, with the more difficult and time consuming cases having been transferred to Probation Subsidy Unit. As a result of the transfer of cases mentioned above, the probation officers have more time to spend with and do a better follow-up job on their remaining caseload."

- Cowlitz County

"Services in the community have also improved. In the past there was very little interaction between the probation department and other agencies. Now we are cooperatively working with the schools, DSHS local office, Center for Youth Services, Employment Security, and the Mental Health Center for diagnostic services. Our department is participating in an Interagency Conference Committee consisting of representatives from schools, DSHS, public health, and mental health. The purpose of the Interagency Conference is to identify problem areas for youth with whom one or more of the agencies are working and coordinate the services each of us can provide for them."

- Pacific/Wahkiakum Counties

"Local mental health services have expanded from a half-time therapist in October 1972, to a service at present with one full-time director/therapist, two full-time therapists, a half-time nurse and a secretary. Local schools have added two full-time special education teachers, a full and part-time counselor, a full-time principal, and a new remedial class and instructor for youths with learning and behavior problems."

- San Juan County

"I do not believe that in my 12 years on the bench I have been more enthusiastic concerning a program as I have been in connection with this one. I have great anticipation for the successful results that I think this program will attain. I believe this money will be very well spent on the local level in bringing about the best results for our troubled young people. In addition, hopefully the program will be able to save the State of Washington an overall sizable sum of money if our experience is anything like it has been elsewhere in this regard."

It should again be pointed out that these statements are the subjective appraisals of participating counties, and while they are attitudes that appear to be held by all responding counties, they represent a subset of all the participating counties in the State. Consequently, they cannot be used to make final conclusions in evaluating objective three. They do, however, provide substantial support to the notion that it has been met, and they are presented here for the purpose of giving the reader a feel for the perspective of participating counties.

The final in which the third objective was assessed was to analyze the computer file data. Some of this information was reported above for the first objective. This data indicated that an increasing number of persons have been placed in Probation Subsidy since its establishment with nearly 2,000 individuals in the program in 1974.

By the end of 1974, there was a total of 2,976 reported releases; 8 in 1971, 671 in 1972, 952 in 1973 and 1,345 in 1974. Caution must be maintained in any interpretation of numbers released during given years or the total time period as compared to numbers assigned: as pointed out below, only those releases during the four year period who had also been assigned during the four year period were counted.

Of the total 4,898 reported assignments to Probation Subsidy, 1,195 (24.4%) were female and 3,703 (75.6%) were male. In both cases the range in age was from 8-18 years. Data in Table 2 show that in both the male and female populations, the 15 and 16 year-old groups combined account for slightly over 52% of the population. When examining Table 2 in reference to type of "offensive assignment" (that offense which directly attributed to the assignment of the juvenile to Probation Subsidy), it can be seen that "ungovernable" behavior and "running away" (status offenses) account for 28.6% and 25.7% of female assignments to Probation Subsidy. For males, burglary, larceny (all except shoplifting) and auto theft (Property offenses) account for 26.9%, 11.1%, and 12.9% of all assignments respectively. The next largest group of offenses for females is property offenses; for males it is status offenses. Sex, age at assignment, and "offense of assignment"

for assignments by race (white, black, Indian, other) are shown in Appendices C1 through C4. This data indicate that a wide range of types of offenders have been placed in Probation Subsidy.

Assignments by sex, age at assignment, and service needs are shown in Table 3. Approximately 94% of all assignments to Probation Subsidy have a need for individual counseling. Individual counseling required by the client is reported for approximately 40% of the juveniles than the next highest need area. In general, both male and female assignments to the program have parental counseling, family counseling, revised educational program and cultural or recreational activity needs as the next four largest need areas. The need for foster home placement as a service is reported for nearly twice as many female assignments as male assignments. Twenty-one percent of the females assigned to Probation Subsidy are reported to need foster home placement, in contrast to 9.5% of the males.

Assignments by race, sex, and year of assignment are shown in Table 4. Of the total 4,898 assignments to Probation Subsidy; 4,291 (87.6%) were white, 341 (6.9%) were black, 125 (2.6%) were Indian, and 141 (2.9%) were "other". The distribution of percentages of males and females by race are similar.

The distribution of assignments to Probation Subsidy by county of assignment and service needs are shown in Table 5. King and Pierce Counties with 853 (17.4%) and 807 (16.5%) assignments respectively account for approximately one-third (1/3) of the total assignments to the program. The impact of service needs indicated by these two counties, as related

to the service needs of all other counties, can be seen quite clearly; e.g., King County reports financial assistance as a service need for 220 of a total of 853 assignments. This represents 25.8% of their total assignments; a percentage much higher than that shown by any other single county. Table 6 shows service needs at assignment by year of assignment for all assignments to the program. A high degree of consistency in the type of service needs required by clients assigned for each of the different years within the four year time period can be seen. Appendices D1 and D2 present the same data for females and males individually. Appendices D3 through D6 show the same data for race and Appendices D7 through D12 show the data by offense category. In all cases, service needs in the various counties are not substantially different.

Data pertaining to assignments to Juvenile Probation Subsidy during calendar years 1971 through 1974 by frequency of offense of assignment and year of assignment are shown in Table 7. For all four years, between 60% and 66% of the admissions have had a reported commitment offense frequency of "once" indicated; i.e., whatever the offense of assignment, it was shown to have been committed only once. Between 18% and 20% of the clients are shown as having committed their offense of assignment "twice". Between 7% and 10% of the clients are shown as having committed the offense three times. Percentages of clients with offense frequencies of more than three dropped dramatically.

The assignments to Probation Subsidy by the total "court known referrals" reported prior to assignment by the year of assignment are shown in Table 8. Of the 4,898 assignments during the time period, 24.9% had been

referred to the court one time, 20.9% had been referred twice, 18.3% had been referred three times, and 12.7% had been referred four times.

Data pertaining to "reason for release" for releases by county are shown in Table 9. Of the 2,976 total releases, 1,459 (49.0%) were released as "adjustment adequate to warrant discharge" and 337 (11.3%) were committed to a juvenile institution. King and Pierce Counties with 395 (13.3%) and 468 (15.7%) account for approximately one-third of all releases.

Releases from Juvenile Probation Subsidy by services provided and year of release are shown in Table 10. Approximately 55.9% of the total releases were provided individual counseling. This service was provided for more releases than any other service; the next most frequently provided services being parental counseling (11.6%). The same data for females and males are shown in Appendices E1 and E2. Data for race are shown in Appendices E3 through E6, and data by offense grouping are shown in Appendices E7 through E12. Table 11 shows releases by commitment offense and length of stay. The mean length of stay for all releases is 8.8 months. These findings indicate that large numbers of services have been given to probationers in the Subsidy Program.

Table 12 shows "case rating at assignment" by "case ratings" at release for certain behavior manifestations. For those clients with an unsatisfactory case rating at time of assignment, 25% to 37% showed no change. Seventeen to 47% of the youths moved from unsatisfactory to marginal and from 18% to 42% moved from unsatisfactory to satisfactory. For those who

were marginal at the time of assignment, 32 to 47% showed no change at the time of release; 3% to 17% dropped to unsatisfactory, and 36% to 54% were rated satisfactory. Those were rated as satisfactory at the time of assignment, 71% to 90% showed no change, 7% to 18% dropped down to marginal and 6% to 7% dropped to unsatisfactory.

Table 13 shows the number of service needs and services provided in addition to individual counseling. Of the total of 4,898 assignments, 4,596 (93.8%) were shown as needing individual counseling while 302 (6.2%) were shown as having no need for individual counseling. In addition, 2,821 (57.6%) were shown to need no more than three services other than individual counseling. Individual counseling was provided for 1,664 (55.9%) of all releases; 1,825 (61.3%) received no service other than individual counseling.

Table 14 shows the type of commitment offense by type of offenses committed during the program, if any. Offenses are grouped into six major categories; driving, drugs, person, property, status, and other. To reiterate a previous point, commitment offense is that offense which directly resulted in the juvenile's assignment to the Probation Subsidy Program. Data in the table shows that for offenders (with the exception of person and property offenders) who had committed offenses during the program participation, the largest percentage were either "other" offenses or "status" offenses which are generally non-violent and misdemeanor offenses. Of those persons with a "person" commitment offense, only 37 (13.7%) subsequently committed a "person" offense during program participation, while 88 (32.6%) committed "property" offenses. For property offenders with

subsequent offenses during the program, 715 (33.6%) committed property offenses, 576 (27.1%) committed "other" offenses and 490 (23%) committed status offenses. It must be remembered that these data represent the number of offenses committed during the program and not the number of persons who committed offenses. A given juvenile within any one of the commitment offense categories may have contributed to the numbers in more than one of the "during program" offense categories.

Data in Table 15 shows the commitment offenses by number of clients committing offenses during program participation. Of the 2,976 releases, 1,342 (45.1%) had committed offenses during the time that they were participating in the Probation Subsidy Program. Of the 2,976 releases, 1,634 (54.9%) had committed no offenses during the time that they participated in the program. Of those who did commit offenses while in the program, 1,547 (52%) committed only one offense, 29 (1%) committed two offenses, 29 (1%) committed three offenses, and 29 (1%) committed four offenses.

#### Discussion of Findings

Specific objectives for the Probation Subsidy Program were defined by the state and county directors involved in establishing programs. The first of these objectives was to reduce commitment rates to state juvenile rehabilitation facilities by 25% or more in participating counties. Data presented in Figure 1, Figure 2, and Table 1 show that this objective has been met. First and re-admissions to Cascadia Reception Diagnostic Center have dropped dramatically since implementation of the Probation Subsidy Program in July of 1970. Data indicate an increase of 70 first and re-admissions between 1973 and 1974; however, available data also show an

increase in direct discharges (discharges from CRDC climbed from 11 in FY 1972 to a total of 117 in 1974). Juvenile Probation Subsidy diagnostic commitments which result in direct discharges from CRDC undoubtedly comprise a large percentage of these releases since this is by far the largest number of direct discharges shown in the ten year history of CRDC and is in direct coordination with the beginning of the "diagnostic commitment" for Probation Subsidy. These data indicate that the first objective of Probation Subsidy (to reduce commitments to juvenile rehabilitation facilities by 25% or more in participating counties) has been met. The reduction in commitments is highly unlikely to be able to be explained by any chance factor. In actuality, commitment rates from participating counties have been reduced by more than 50%.

The data obtained from the DSHS Operations Review report shows that the second objective, to reduce overall costs to the State for rehabilitating selected delinquent youth, has also been met. It is estimated that there is a savings of \$18,988 per average commitment.

There is subjective report information from a large sampling of participating counties which supports the success of the third goal: reduced probation officer caseloads, and funds in purchasing additional services. Finally, the ample program descriptive information that the Subsidy Program has been implemented statewide and is treating large number of clients within the range of services as intended. Although the quality and the degree of success of these services is beyond the scope of this evaluation, the program appears to be operating as intended.

By way of general conclusions, it is clear that the Juvenile Probation Subsidy Program has been established on a statewide basis with 31 out of 39 counties participating. It is providing services where none previously existed, appears to have upgraded pre-existing services, and has had a pronounced effect on commitment rates to juvenile institutions resulting in significant financial savings to the State.

#### Methodological Considerations

Although the existing data system for the Probation Subsidy Program provides a great deal of information concerning the client and his level of program participation, there were some complicating factors that made it difficult to conduct an evaluation of program performance to date. Data are not available on "regular" county probation caseloads. The Probation Subsidy data system was not implemented until March 1971 and, as a result, activities during 1970 cannot be examined. Delays in submission of program documents and data processing have combined to produce a rather protracted time lag. Therefore, only data pertaining to program activities through the end of 1974 were available for analyses. In addition, there are certain deficiencies in the Probation Subsidy data system (offense item coordination, identifiers inconsistent with follow-up, etc.) which must be corrected to enhance the effectiveness of the system as a "data resource" for both the continuing operation and periodic examination of the program. Furthermore, the Criminal Justice Information Sub-System developed by the Department of Social and Health Services has not been implemented; no program participation data are available at the current time. This fact alone makes it impossible for this study to "follow-up" those Probation Subsidy cases subsequently committed to juvenile institutions. Finally, there was a time limitation that restricted the depth and breadth of this review.

Due to the above factors, the data presented in this document are limited to those clients assigned to Probation Subsidy and for whom assignment reports were completed between January 1, 1971 and December 31, 1974. Data for releases, consequently, are restricted to those clients admitted and released during the above time frame.

This review suffers from the shortcoming of having limited county staff input. No field involvement was undertaken because of limitations posed by the short study time frame. In an attempt to obtain as much field input as possible, however, narrative comments were sought from the counties. Responses were received from 16 of the participating counties. Financial data available for use during the evaluation was obtained from the DSHS Operations Review Office.

It is suggested that in the future in order to complete a more thorough evaluation, four basic needs should be met. First, the Probation Subsidy information system needs to be updated; the relationship between specific items within the system as well as the relationship between the overall system and other pertinent information systems has to be reaffirmed. Second, the DSHS Criminal Justice Information System must be made fully operational so that "follow-up" studies of juveniles entering DSHS for diagnosis or commitment can be completed. Third, time must be made available so that evaluative efforts can be carried out in the field. Fourth, some type of comparison group is needed to assess whether or not Subsidy Program participants are involved in subsequent and/or repeat offenses less often than non-participants. It should be recognized, however, that establishing suitable comparison groups entails overcoming formidable methodological, logistical, and possibly ethical problems. These efforts should be concerned

with an objective examination of the "regular" probation caseload as well as an in-depth analysis of the specific impacts of Probation Subsidy at the county level.



DURING FISCAL YEARS 1965 THROUGH 1974


